

#### **Minister's Meditation**

#### The Rev. Jennie Barrington, Interim Minister

""Most people lead lives of quiet desperation." (Adapted from the words of Henry David Thoreau)

Dear Members and Friends,

I got a lovely phone call from a friend of a friend. She is Unitarian Universalist, and this summer, she will be retiring and moving to our fair and friendly city. She is doing wise and careful planning for this next chapter in her life. That planning includes not only her material and physical needs, but also emotional and spiritual care and support. She is beginning to plan now so that, once she arrives in Columbia, she will have communities of "like-minded people." I am happily anticipating the time my new friend will get to spend with me, and with all of you.

When I told our Director of CYRE, Stephanie Palmer-Smith, about the phone call, she said, "How nice to know that someone new is coming here." "Exactly," I replied. Then a few minutes later it occurred to me how nice, and how very important, it was for our soon -to-be-new-member to know that *we* are here-- as the solid, strong, brave, hardy, and lively Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Columbia, South Carolina. She looked us up --my new friend did-and she found that, where there might have been nothing, there was and is a Unitarian Universalist congregation that has been both a sanctuary for liberal thinkers and bonfire of activism, for over sixty -five years. Praises Be! UUCC has been here, and still is here, and will continue to be here for decades hence!

Imagine, for a moment, if our UU congregation were not here at all. In fact, your leadership and I would like you to imagine that all month long. If UUCC were not here, there would be such a desperate need for all that it is and does that someone would have to begin to create it from scratch. Someone would have to put an ad in *The State* that asked, "Are you a UU and don't know it?" and plan a meeting in a rented space, just like our founders did in the late 1940s. Then they'd have to see if enough people turned out to be a viable group. And they'd have to figure out how to organize themselves. That little group would soon dream of owning their own building and grounds, so that landlords would not turn them away because of the inclusive, progressive programs they were holding. Our founders *were* turned away, including for their activities advocating for racial equality. And UUCC still hosts programs speaking out against racism—two even in my short time serving you, and one this evening on the UUA's choice for a "Common Read" book: *Just Mercy*, by Bryan Stevenson.

Beginning this Sunday, and all during the month of March, your leaders and I will be presenting to you this year's Pledge Drive: "A Place to be Our Best Selves." It's going to be a lot of fun! And it will be many opportunities for you to tell us what brings you to UUCC, what keeps you coming to UUCC, and your hopes and dreams for UUCC. I admit that it is a harsh question to pose to you: "What if our congregation were not here at all?" Contemplating that question really gives me pause. But it also makes me feel deeply grateful that UUCC is here, and is on such solid footing, and is doing so much good, for our members and friends, and in the wider community. Contemplating the many ways UUCC enriches people's lives, including my own, makes me want to invest in it, for its current worthy endeavors, and so it will continue to make people's lives better for many years to come.

Those are conversations worth having— Indeed, they will be the most important conversations we'll have in UUCC's "church year." So please sign up to attend a cottage meeting (there are clipboards in the foyer), so we can hear what you value, and what you hope for, for UUCC. Your leadership and I promise we will listen much more than we talk. And we will make careful note of what you have to say. You will influence us, and be part of shaping the direction of UUCC's future. So please come to a cottage meeting, and speak right up, and help guide UUCC in flourishing into *its* fullest best self.

I look forward to hearing your thoughts, Rev. Jennie ("It's a privilege to be here.")

### **Community Conversations**

On Sunday, February 21, our Social Action Committee hosted its second in a series of Community Conversations. The topic was Talking to Children about Issues of Race, moderated by Dr. Marilyn Izzard of USC Upstate and our co-president (and my husband), Marc.

The event served to demonstrate why I, like so many of our members, am proud to be a part of this congregation. The purpose of the event was for participants to gain a greater understanding of the issue and to leave better equipped to have conversations with their children about race. The planners organized a very successful event that showed the UUCC knows how to get things done right.

Some highlights from the panelists included:

Dr. John Dozier, USC's Chief Diversity Officer, reminding us that "talking about race is not racist. We must teach our children how to talk about race. Unless we are uncomfortable, we are not learning. It is ok to be uncomfortable. We need to offer our children a world perspective."

Sheriff Leon Lott emphasized that "children watch what we do. We are role models. We all have an obligation to teach our children to talk about race. Children pay attention and they do not understand why we accept unfairness. Our children can be the teachers of their parents."

Sheriff Lott asked, "Where is the media for this very important conversation?" Adding that we can get tremendous coverage for political rhetoric over the weekend but no one is wanting to promote the importance of community members coming together to engage in these conversations.

Helen Nelson Grant, Richland School District Two's Chief Diversity Officer stated that "we must acknowledge our own biases and then work toward ameliorating these biases. We should look to our own actions and how we transmit our biases to our children. Our biases keep us from us forming relationships. She also spoke about stereotypes of poverty within racial groups - racial biases within racial groups. Separation, self- segregation, occurs naturally but inclusion requires effort and purpose. Purposeful inclusion brings strength and is well worth the effort."

UUCC member Dr. Pippin Whitaker shared that everyone soaks up the biases of our community. "We swim in our culture and we do not see our bias. We must be willing to be uncomfortable in order to confront our biases. We must address the patterns of collateral damage caused when one in three Black men spend time in jail. We need to talk with our children about bias and racism in ways that promote creativity and hope."

### **Community Conversations, continued**

Dr. Dan Wuori, Deputy Director of First Steps to School Readiness, added that young kids have a true sense of fairness. "We can have compelling conversations with young children about slavery, discrimination, and unfairness. We need more conversations with our kids. Our conversations do not need to be shielded. We can have powerful, authentic,

and respectful conversations about difficult topics with young children."

Ms. Mary Lynne Diggs, Head Start Collaboration Director, talked about socioeconomics and its connection with racial perspectives. "We must consider the limited opportunities resulting from living in poverty. We must help our children to feel comfortable taking about race and unfairness."

The panelists superbly shared stories and suggestions that helped all of us think deeply and consider ways to engage children in the topics of race relations.

The event was another example of how several of our various committees come together for the good of the congregation. From the outstanding display of books to the organization of the refreshments to the tech support to the Social Action Committee and its publicity support who informed the community through various media venues about the discussion, including the posters, everyone shared their talent and support to ensure the event's success.

This is what the UUCC is all about, pulling its resources and talents to get things done and to get things done right. This week we will kickoff our annual pledge drive and it is in that spirit that we will move our congregation forward in the coming year.

We get things done and we get things done right. As we consider our pledges for the coming fiscal year, please ask yourself, "what can I do to help get things done?" It is through our pledges that we build our budget that will help us continue to get things done right.

Like many of my fellow UUCC members I grew up at a time when grandparents, great aunts and uncles and other elders lived close by. They were part of our family celebrations, Sunday dinners and impacted our lives in ways we may only start understanding and appreciating later in life. They enriched our lives, teaching us crafts and cooking while preserving our family histories through story-telling. I learned to crochet from my Grandma, sew from my Grammie, and was thoroughly entertained by the story-telling of my great Uncle John. We weren't such a transient society at that time nor did we spend such a great amount of time finding our entertainment in front of a TV. It was common to have regular interactions with family members from all generations.

But things have changed. People move around a lot more leaving their extended families behind. Many children grow up not having weekly or even monthly interactions with people from earlier generations. And they are missing out on an integral piece of their development. Well informed parents, who recognize their children's needs to have these special relationships will seek them out from other sources. And our congregation here at the UUCC is rich with this source of love, experience, and caring. We have members who take the time to cultivate relationships with our children and youth to not only give but to be on the receiving end. As so many people have experienced, being with youth is very beneficial. While we can become energized from their activity, we are also awed by their creativity and passions. We keep a part of our youthful selves alive by interacting with these younger members, creating for ourselves a richer and more meaningful existence. Sometimes these experiences can lessen depression or prevent it all together. The positive impact of shared time between older adults and children is for all of us.

I thank all of you who have been a positive influence on our children and youth here at UUCC and I look forward to welcoming many more of you into our rich and active CYRE programming. Do you have a passion for social action? Mentor one of our older children at the Sunday "Food Not Bombs" project. Are you interested in fun and games? Play "Who's Who at the UU" with our youth. Do you have an idea or a burning passion for something you would like to facilitate for us? We would love to have you. Put a little dance in your step, a little fire in your kiln. Enjoy the uplifting energy of our children and youth.

#### **Brief Biography of the Rev. Ann Marie Alderman:**

The Reverend Ann Marie Alderman is in her third year as the Developmental Minister with the UU Church of Greensboro. She has served churches in Florida, Pennsylvania, and in Eastern North Carolina. Her undergraduate studies were in religion at Florida State University and her theological studies were at Vanderbilt Divinity School. After earning her M.Div., she spent several decades in "alternative" careers, including as an automobile mechanic. For nearly twenty years she managed her family's wood flooring business in their home town of Jacksonville, Florida. By mid-life the urge to find a deeper purpose began with her move to Savannah, Georgia. While living there, she found the giant welcome offered by the tiny Statesboro, GA UU fellowship. That welcome was a way back to her call to the ministry and a way in to this great Unitarian Universalist way of being! She has served as a Ministerial Settlement Representative (MSR) for the Transitions Office of the UUA since 2014, working with congregations and their search committees in the Southern Region.

This occurs when the moon is in opposition to the Sun (when it is on the opposite side of the Earth from the Sun; more precisely, when the ecliptic longitudes of the Sun and Moon differ by 180 degrees). [1] This means that the hemisphere of the Moon that is facing the Earth (the near side) is almost fully illuminated by the Sun and appears round (while the far side is almost completely unilluminated). 

#### **UUCC Board of Trustees**

Summary of January 20, 2016 Meeting

The Board of Trustees met January 20, 2016 from 6:30 to 9:47 PM.

#### **Interim Minister's Report**

We are asked to do an Appraisal of the Interim Process three times during the interim ministry. The first deadline is February 15. Rev. Jennie shared her assessment of our progress and there was considerable discussion about it. Board members submitted their completed assessments to the Board Secretary to be compiled for submission to Boston along with Rev. Jennie's.

Reflection on the Start-Up Weekend
Board members offered a critique of the experience held January 8-10, facilitated by Marguerite Mills. Attendance was good, larger than Ms Mills has seen at previous Start-Up programs. The meetings were well-facilitated and respectful; the food was good. There were also some shortcomings; the format was not well suited for that size group; there was a disconnect between Friday evening and Saturday morning. Some attendees thought Rev. Jennie's sermon on Sunday morning was more helpful than the prior discussions.

<u>Update on Ministerial Settlement Weekend</u> This event is scheduled for March 5 & 6 with Rev. Ann Marie Alderman as our consultant/facilitator. She will meet with the Board on Saturday evening to talk about our role in the process of searching for and selecting a settled minister. On Sunday morning Rev. Alderman will preach and after the service we will have a meal and she will explain the process of selecting a search committee and how the congregation participates in the search process.

#### **Treasurer's Report**

Linda Brennison reported that the total revenue shortfall for the fiscal year to date is \$5,505.31, a significant decrease over last month's shortfall of \$9,138.30. Expenses are 2% under budget. Staff compensation and committee expenditures are under budget. Operating expenses are on target. The improvement in pledges received probably indicates that people donated more before the end of the year for income tax purposes.

#### **Pledge Drive**

Joe Long reported that the annual canvass will begin February 28. The Finance Committee is planning to have cottage meetings in members' homes during the first half of March.

#### **Building Renovations**

Peck Drennan presented drawings and more information about building renovations. There is asbestos in the social hall ceiling and in part of the ceiling in the RE wing. Both of these areas can be covered. New lighting is needed in the RE hallway along with new hardware for the doors and possibly some new doors. Peck reported there are major air quality control issues in the RE wing. There are several tests needed for substances in the air (cost \$1,400-\$1,500). The duct work needs cleaned; equipment will be placed in the air space to scrub it for three days (cost \$3,435). Another issue we will need to address is how to create separation between the sanctuary and the social hall.

#### **Committee Reports**

<u>Technology Committee – UUCC Website</u> Considerable frustration was expressed about the delays in getting the new website up and operating. It currently presents a poor picture of our congregation and is not likely to attract the kind of minister we are hoping to obtain. Regina Moody reported that the people working on the new UUA framework are having difficulty because that framework needs to be modified to match our programs. They need to eliminate some categories/headings and make other adjustments which require judgment about the template. The Board voted for the Co-Presidents to select an ad hoc group to accelerate work to get the website up and running.

#### **New Business**

<u>Congregational Poll</u> The UUA is asking congregations to vote on Congregational Study/Action Issues (CSAIs) to be added to the 2016 General Assembly agenda. One will be selected and adopted for four years of study, reflection, and action. The four proposed for this year are: a national conversation on race, the corruption of our democracy, climate change and environmental justice, and ending gun violence in America. Board members will receive a ballot to vote on those issues.
