Minister's Meditation

The Rev. Jennie Barrington, Interim Minister

"I did not think I was going to die. Based on my experience, I was confident that I could make an emergency water landing that was survivable. That confidence was stronger than any fear."

[Captain Chesley ("Sully") B. Sullenberger, III., from <u>Highest</u> <u>Duty</u>, p. 237]:

Dear Members and Friends,

Have you seen the movie, Sully? It is a thing of beauty. And Captain Sullenberger's landing of that plane on the Hudson River eight years ago, which all 155 people survived, was a thing of beauty that continues to inspire me. In January, I will preach about "Sully's" amazing feat, and also his highly commendable values, ethics, and character. But what is perhaps most inspiring to me is that, to him, that amazing true story is not, ultimately, about him. To him, it is about all of the people who, when they heard that there was great need, assisted in helping others to get safely home. To Captain Sullenberger, that story is, above all else, about the work and care and collaboration of his co-pilot, the flight attendants, his whole crew, the ferry boat crews, and the emergency responders. Captain Sullenberger values human beings, their accomplishments, and their potential. He has an unusually high reverence for human life. He believes that, when a fellow human being is in distress, we must, not be a bystander, but do all we can to help. He is not one to use religious language. I would call him a Secular Humanist. His book does not mention miracles, God, or Jesus. And he says that he did not pray when the plane was going down. He focused on doing his duty to everyone on the plane.

Yesterday, we launched our Capital Campaign for renovations to our building. It, too, was a thing of beauty. And we all had so much fun! Yesterday was the culmination of many months of information-gathering and research, discussions and prioritizing, brainstorming creative ideas and plain old-fashioned hard work. Your Capital Campaign team includes: Pat Mohr (Our Fearless Leader and Chair), Don Dodson, Dot Brown, Kevin Meredith, and Nancie Shillington-Perez, helped and supported by Joe Long (Chair of the Finance Committee), Phil Turner (our ubiquitous President), and Peck Drennan (our Architect). A special mention of gratitude and delight goes to Ruth Saunders, for the models she designed and created of what the completed renovations could look like. Please thank and congratulate all these people for a day and an event that was one of the highlights of my career. I will leave it to them to tell you the exact figure that our initial launch has raised. But "early returns" show that you are well on your way to realizing your goal. Yesterday exceeded my expectations, and I am so pleased and proud of all of you, and all that you have accomplished.

I know that some of you were afraid that, at this time, a Capital Campaign might not succeed. But for many months, I have believed that a Capital Campaign could and would be a happy success. —so long as all of UUCC's members and friends, like all of the people who made "The Miracle on the Hudson" happen, responded to a great need, by stepping up and helping, generously, collaboratively, and companionably. Our Capital Campaign will continue over the course of the next three weeks. The train has left the station, and is moving along fast and well and inspiringly. Between now and the finish line, let us all do all we can to strengthen and support UUCC as a home for Unitarian Universalism in our region, and beyond—for the pride of it, for the joy of it, for the fellowship of it, and, most importantly, for the good clean fun of it!

Direction Reflection Exploration

We will be coming together as a congregation on Friday evening to view a documentary honoring the courageous work of a Unitarian minister and his wife during one of the most horrific times in our human history. I am looking forward to seeing this again with many of you but more importantly, I am looking forward to what this Ken Burns documentary might inspire our congregation to do to show support of the refugees fleeing Syria, the world's latest efforts to decimate populations based on religious beliefs.

By some estimates, over 12 million Syrians have had to flee their homes, half of them children. That's over 6 million children who have had to leave the safety of their homes, some without parents accompanying them. It is hard to fathom that many people whose lives are threatened daily, who have to leave their families to be safe. And I know it is an issue that pulls at the heartstrings and begs us to step up to a higher and greater calling. I believe that we as a congregation can make a difference in this struggle. The question is how? Will we join our Muslim neighbors in raising funds for refugees? Will we write our leaders asking them to increase the numbers of refugees from Syria we allow to come to our shores? Will we participate in demonstrations to show our solidarity with people seeking peace in the Middle East? Will we place signs on our lawn letting our neighbors know we support Syrian refugees whether they be Muslim, Christian, or other? Whatever action we take collectively will be an action I will embrace. And again, I can be proud of our UU heritage as well as proud of our positive actions today.

Frequently Asked Questions about the Ministerial Search

Question: When Do We Vote For Our Favorite Minister?

Answer: Congregants do not choose the minister directly.

Rather, the congregation elects a search committee to act on its behalf and make recommendations to the Board of Trustees. This ministerial search committee, which consists of Linda Brennison, Rod Brown, David Crockett, Rebecca Drennan, Brian Dudick, Ann Johnson, and Buzzie Kelly, will identify and interview candidates who match the congregation's needs and make recommendations to the Board, which will decide whether to extend an offer to a given candidate or abort the process.

Congregants still play a crucial role. They provide the committee with a clear picture of the congregation's strengths, challenges, needs and preferences. That is essential if the search committee is to identify ministers who may be a "fit" for the congregation. Many good ministers will not be a good fit for UUCC. So please, be sure to participate in a focus group and/or fill out a survey.

Question: Which Ministers Are Being Considered?

Answer: Unless the Board directs the search committee to end its participation in the UUA's candidate selection process, those will be the only candidates under consideration.

The selection process will include newly-minted seminarians along with experienced ministers from all over the country considering a move to a different congregation. Any minister is potentially eligible to participate in the process by contacting the UUA and declaring interest, even if he or she is not currently serving a UUA member congregation.

A major advantage of participating in the UUA process for congregations is that it serves as a clearinghouse that brings interested congregations and ministers together on the same (virtual) platform, sharing the same information, on the same schedule. For candidates, the anonymity it affords them is especially important to those ministers who are currently serving congregations. Invariably, some of them will choose to return rather than leave.

Let me also be clear that this ministerial search committee is open to considering ministers outside the UUA's candidate selection process. As numerous congregants have noted, this congregation has successfully hired outside the process (as have others). Please be aware however, that congregations may **NOT** entertain outside candidates and participate in the UUA process simultaneously. In other words, they must choose one or the other. They cannot do both. If the Board wishes to opt out of the UUA process it can redirect the search committee or disband it.

Question: What Happens Now?

Answer: The search committee is preparing the Congregational Record, preparing for the Beyond Categorical Thinking Workshop, and preparing to interview candidates. (See the search committee's calendar in the foyer.)

Immediately, the committee is collecting data from a variety of sources, including a survey, multiple focus groups, and archival records (e.g., past and current budgets). We are using that data to paint an accurate picture of who we are as a congregation. From that picture, we will create a report (a "Congregational Record") that serves as the primary information source for candidates. They will use the Congregational Record to decide their level of interest in us. **So, we need to hear from everyone** in order to provide candidates with an accurate representation of the UUCC.

Short term, UUA representatives will conduct a workshop with us during a November worship service, called *Beyond Categorical Thinking*. Its purpose is to prompt discussion of what we need in a minister. I suspect that most of us will be surprised at the diversity of opinions on what is important in a minister. In a congregation of our size, no single ministerial candidate is likely to match every single congregant's ideal. The key is to find the best possible match for who we are right now <u>AND</u> who we want to be moving forward. The search committee has very little doubt that this congregation will be quite attractive to high-quality ministers, both new and experienced.

Long(ish) term, the UUA selection process "goes live" in late November. The committee will begin contacting mutually interested candidates for phone interviews likely in January of 2017. In the spring of 2017, the committee will arrange to observe preferred candidates at neutral congregations throughout the Southeast. In the spring, if all goes well, the committee will recommend a candidate to the Board.

Share the Plate Nomination Form for 2017

Members and Friends age 18 and older are invited to nominate organizations to be our <u>2017</u> Share the Plate recipients. The UUCC donates half of our cash collections each month to an outside charity or social justice organization chosen by our members. Thanks to our congregation's generosity, we have donated over <u>\$50,000</u> in Share the Plate contributions to community charities over the past <u>five</u> years. Voting will take place in November to choose the recipients from among the top two nominees in each category.

Categories: There are 10 categories of recipients, each of which will be selected for one month in 2017. Members and Friends can nominate organizations in one or more categories, provided it is a 501(c)(3) not-for profit organization. To confirm its status, check the organization's website to verify it is a 501(c)(3).

SUNSET FELINES - YOUR OPPORTUNITY TO HELP

In the past it has seemed that the Animal Ministry events have, for the most part, centered around dogs. While this in no way has been our intention, the activities (e.g., Blessing of the Animals, Bark to the Park) have been more dog friendly than cat friendly. We have now been given an opportunity to perform many acts of kindness for the cats in our community, in a wide variety of ways!

We have been approached by Frankie Johnson, director of Sunset Felines, who has expressed several areas of critical need, and we know that you all can help! Sunset Felines is a group of volunteers who banded together in 2001 to address the problem of homeless/feral cats living in our community. They are not a shelter, but are dedicated to improving the lives of these animals by controlling the population through a method called "T.N.R" (Trap, Neuter, Return). The colonies where these cats live require feeding twice daily, which Sunset Felines' volunteers provide.

Back at Frankie's house, although she does not run a shelter, are about 40 cats who, for whatever reason (age, illness, potential adoptability, etc.) also must also be cared for daily. You can well imagine the number of tasks and expenses associated with such an operation!

So in a nutshell, she *needs volunteers desperately*. I also suggest that you go onto the Sunset Felines' Facebook page. There you can see a detailed "lay of the land."

Another critical need, which follows from taking care of all these creatures, is for food and other supplies. You can contact Frankie or me for a list.

And inevitably, we are faced with circumstances in life that are like that—they need an immediate decision, but also give us the opportunity to examine our values and act so as to convey those values to the larger community. This is the anniversary of the historic floods. And we have launched our Capital Campaign for renovations to our building. A Straw Man, a White Elephant, and a Perfect Storm are three idioms that can help us come up with answers to the question, "Given the best of all possible worlds, what outcome do you most wish for?"


First Sunday of Capital Campaign was a HUGE Success!

This fall, a short course at UUCC will be devoted to the sociology of American religion. The course is based on the book by Robert D. Putnam and David E. Campbell American Grace (2010, revised 2012). See reviews at www.americangrace.org. Putnam is a distinguished political scientist at Harvard University, while Campbell is an associate professor at Notre Dame.

American Grace is based on extensive surveys of religion and public life in America. Studies of congregations complement interview findings. The book assesses both the sociology of American religion and its directions of change. The course should assist those who are active in UU groups to understand and work with the dynamics of congregations. For instance, we will consider such issues as why members join congregations, why they stay, and why they leave.

There will be a charge of \$5.00 for the course, to cover the price of the copied materials and an outline of the for this event. We will gather at 8:50 a.m. and work until text. The course will meet for an hour and a half on Sundays, starting at 1:00 p.m. after services. It will meet in six sessions, with the first class on October 2 and continuing on 10/16, 10/30, 11/6, 12/4, 12/18. Summary of August 17, 2016 Meeting

The Board of Trustees met August 17, 2016 from 6:30 to 8:50 PM.

Treasurer's Report

Bob Whitaker reported that July was a good month financially. Pledge payments were \$2,600 over our monthly expectation. Plate collections were higher than expected. We had anticipated collecting \$1,000 from un-met pledges for the 2015-16 budget year; we actually received \$1,230. Bob noted that there were five Sundays in July.

Committee Reports

David Roof is chair of the <u>Technology Services Committee</u>. The <u>Personnel Committee</u> is accepting applications for the custodial position. <u>Building and Grounds</u> has hired a contractor to work on our grounds. The <u>Finance Committee</u> plans to launch a Capital Campaign on September 25. The <u>CYRE</u> lost money on Hogwarts Camp this summer.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Brokerage Account The Board opened a brokerage account so we can receive gifts of stocks.

<u>Approval of Goals for 2016-17</u> During our all-day retreat on August 6, the Board developed goals for this fiscal year. They were refined slightly since that meeting and are listed below.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>Board Representative to Ministerial Search Negotiating Team</u> The Board selected Bob Whitaker to serve with Linda Brennison and David Crockett from the Search Committee on this Team. They will develop a draft ministry agreement that reflects the relationship the congregation hopes to have with the minister it calls. After the Board approves that draft, the Team will negotiate it with the ministerial candidate.

Appraisal of Interim Ministry It is time for another appraisal of the interim ministry to be sent to Boston (September 30 deadline). Rev. Jennie will prepare a draft of her appraisal by September 6 and share it with the Board. Board members will each complete a form and send it to Sandy Chubon who will compile the responses and return them to members before the September meeting. We will discuss the report at our September meeting.

<u>Sponsored Events Budget Procedure</u> A procedure has been developed for use this fiscal year to encourage better financial planning and control for sponsored events.

If expenditures for a UUCC sponsored event are predicted to exceed \$1,000, the sponsoring entity should: (1) designate a person responsible for administering the planning of the event and (2) submit a budget to the Administrator that includes estimated expenditures and income. The Administrator will forward this information to the Board President who will follow up with questions, if necessary.
