Minister's Meditation

The Rev. Jennie Barrington, Interim Minister

"Remarks in the Aftermath of the Election"

Dear Members and Friends,

When I heard the results of the elections, in the early hours of Wednesday morning, I felt like I was on another planet. Almost everyone in our nation is shocked. And many people are grieving, especially if they worked on political campaigns. But I am not on that planet alone; none of us are on that planet alone. We have each other; we have organizations, local, regional, and national, that share our progressive values and mission; we have the Unitarian Universalist Association, and the Standing On the Side of Love movement, and Unitarian Universalists everywhere. And we have Planned Parenthood, and the Black Lives Matter movement, and the ACLU, and the NAACP, and coalitions against gun violence, and organizations that support immigrants and refugees. Now is a time for us all to clarify, articulate, and recommit to the peoples and causes our hearts call us to advocate for, and to volunteer, volunteer, volunteer, volunteer,

When we are shocked, grieving, and aggrieved, we need to give extra attention to caring for ourselves and each other, tenderly. People have told me that they are feeling physically unwell, frightened, emotionally distraught, angry, depressed, unsteady, and/or overwhelmed. In the days ahead, please remember that I, and all of us, are here to listen, and to lend help and support. And we should

keep in mind that everyone processes shock and grief on their own individual timeline. We are here to listen to you. And no one will push you to talk about these things when there are times when you can't do so. When processing shock and grief, try to stay in good habits, and try not to slide into unhealthy habits, because bad habits can become vices. Try to keep getting enough sleep, eat healthily, exercise regularly, and avail yourselves of things that are renewing to your spirit, including songs, poems, quotes, essays, and being out of doors. Try not to lose your sense of awe and wonder. Call up someone who loves you, even if you are not sure what you are going to say. And don't think that you are being overindulgent by saying some of the same things several times. That's how we process shock and grief. And it's going to take many conversations, over many months, for us to begin to make sense of the election season we have just been through, with its wretched rhetoric and behavior.

In the days ahead, we are all going to need extra caring, wisdom, and insight. I know that you, and the many new people who keep joining us, will find that caring, wisdom, and insight in our congregational home. Our congregation is more sorely and urgently needed than ever. It is the fount that strengthens, inspires, comforts, and renews us, as we journey through conflicted and chaotic times. I'll close with the benediction that my mentor, the Rev. Fred Lipp, spoke at the end of every worship service at First Parish Portland, Maine, Unitarian Universalist:

"Fix, oh, Lord, our steps-- so that we may stagger not in the uneven motions of the world-- but go steadily on our way-- neither censoring our journey by the weather we meet-- nor turning aside from anything that might befall us."

I hope to see you at church soon, Rev. Jennie ("It's a privilege to be here.")

I have always been appreciative of our Unitarian Universalist community, but I am especially as I try to come to grips with the election results. I still have not watched any television news and read my first newspaper today. Kubler-Ross's stages of loss has been a good source of information and reassurance that what I am feeling is normal and there is a natural progression that will most likely occur.

The day after the election, I left on a business trip during which I had to meet with a significant number of people. Of course, the election came up and I found myself in conversation with people who hold very different views of the world. It was during those conversations, that the reading and discussions of our book club were helpful, especially Jonathan Haidt's *The Righteous Mind: Why Good People are Divided by Politics and Religion*. These were good people whose 'moral taste buds' are different from mine.

In the midst of this holiday season, we have so much to be thankful for. The success of the Capital Campaign is beyond all expectations. As we prepare to "go public" with our UUCC profile to potential ministers, wouldn't it be wonderful to be able to state that not only have we met the financial goal, but that the overwhelming percentage of the members and friends have participated! Please know that gifts can be of any amount!

As we prepare ourselves for the post-inauguration world, we will reach out to each other to reassure and be reassured. I hope that we will seize the opportunity to reach outside our congregation to spread the message embodied in the UU Principles. Justice, Equity, and Compassion are not only concepts crucial to our civil society, they can be a beacon to attract members. I hope to continue reaching out but also remaining vigilant in the protection of our principles.

Lis and I became UU's in 1979, joining a very small fellowship in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Fred Westover, who was president at that time, would lead off each service by stating that, "We were a small band of religious liberals." This immediately conjured up an image of musicians in a garage and of 20 people on horses with flags emblazoned with "Tolerance" and "Inclusiveness". Thirty-seven years later, we are still a "band of religious liberals". I am so proud to be a member of this congregation and stand in awe of the work that each of you do to make us what we are.

What we need are people willing to advocate for this program, people willing to help us get the word out and make this program one of our shining stars, one of our ways in which we influence and help grow young folks to be proud of themselves, accepting of themselves and others, and have enough knowledge to help them make good, long range decisions. Please be thinking about your children, grandchildren, your neighbors, your children's friends, and any other children you can think of. Help build an OWL class that will give you and your children strong guidance and support in their journey. Get them registered and let's give others an opportunity to experience this program. After all, we have something worth sharing.

Columbia Family Shelter- A shelter that provides emergency food, shelter, resources and hope to homeless families with children in the Midlands area. Started in 1979, this agency works towards the goal of providing a secure, structured environment where families can regain a sense of stability, responding to identified client needs with a variety of supportive services. Congaree Riverkeeper- Congaree Riverkeeper is affiliated with the <u>Waterkeeper Alliance</u>, a global movement of on-the -water advocates who patrol and protect rivers and coasts all over the world. Harvest Hope Food Bank- The mission of Harvest Hope Food Bank is to provide for the needs of hungry people by gathering and sharing quality food with dignity, compassion and education. Capital Campaign Update

We now have \$183,000 in pledges for our building renovations. The board has already started planning the financing, and we have a Committee on Building Renovations to supervise the projects. We're on our way toward new bathrooms, a well-lit RE wing with decent floors, new ceilings in the social hall/sanctuary, and a sanctuary you won't recognize!

But other than raising as much money as possible, the essence of a successful capital campaign is engagement by the entire congregation. At this point, we still have pledges from only about 55% of the congregation; our goal is 100%. No gift is too small because it shows you care! Don't forget that a pledge could be doubled if given before November 30 when the matching opportunity ends. UUCC Board of Trustees

Summary of September 21, 2016 Meeting

The Board of Trustees met September 21, 2016 from 6:30 to 9:07 PM.

Treasurer's Report

Pledge payments are still lower than expected; rentals were higher than planned. Fundraising is far ahead of expectations. We have a positive variance of \$1,284.

Capital Campaign

Pat Mohr is chairing the Capital Campaign committee. She reported to the board that the Campaign will begin September 25. The capital improvements are divided into three parts: remodeling the bathrooms, updating the RE wing, and turning around the sanctuary. Ruthie Saunders has constructed a model of what the sanctuary will look like when it is modified; the model is not done to scale but it is very realistic. The goal is to raise \$180,000 based on Peck's estimates.

UUCC Coffee House

Tim VanDenBerg reported that he met with the Coffee House leaders and he thinks we are back where we were when we began these discussions in 2013. They are not interested in running a business. Tim offered to hire a CPA as a consultant to help them get appropriate procedures set up if they would be willing to do what she recommends. They showed no interest in that idea. We have treated them as a program group but they have not fulfilled their obligations to report to the board. The status quo arrangement leaves us with liability concerns and a possibility of jeopardy to our non-profit status. The Board members agreed to send the Coffee House leaders a letter terminating their status as a program group. We will charge them \$80 rent (for the space and sound equipment) for each performance. They are no longer permitted to use UUCC as part of their name.

Report on Congregational Participation

Phil Turner has done a survey asking committee chairs and other leaders to identify people who have participated in at least one UUCC activity in the last six months. To date, 64% of our members have been identified as participants.

Board Vacancy

We have been functioning with only four members at large on the board this fiscal year because the Leadership Development Committee was not able to find a candidate for the position in May. This leaves us out of compliance with our bylaws. Board members agreed to ask the Leadership Development Committee to try to find someone to fill that position for the remainder of this fiscal year.
