

Dear Members and Friends,

It has been such an anxious month, with political conflict in our nation and around the world. Through making time for heart to heart conversation and companionship, we are making a start at making sense of the discord around us. As I think back on this past month, I am also heartened to realize that we have had many wonderful gatherings in and around the church, to which we've invited neighbors, friends, and guests. These included the Blessing of the Animals ceremony (thank you so much, Anita, and the Animal Ministry team); the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop (thanks to the Search Committee); Thanksgiving Day at the church (thank you so much, Kevin and Michelle); the celebration of the success of our Capital Campaign (with a taco bar!) (thanks to the Capital Campaign team); the Dedication of the Historical Marker honoring our congregational home as the former site of our friends, the Tree of Life Jewish congregation; and the holiday party for the board and staff (thank you, Phil and Lis!). It might seem incongruous that we have continued to gather, feast, talk, and laugh together in such disturbing times. Yet that's exactly what we should be

doing- - creating oases of respect, reverence, and compassion, where we can renew our sense of calm and strength. I envision such oases joining together as a force for even wider and broader respect, reverence, and compassion. In order to continue to be a force for love, in the face of discrimination and hate, we need to give ongoing attention to the renewal of our minds, bodies, and spirits. Here is my prayer for our need for such times of renewal in the New Year:

God of respite for the weary and worried-

Give us a break, at mid-afternoon, whether for coffee or tea-- a break from the stress of the day.

Give us a jumble of mismatched treats, to share with old friends and new:

Warm pie with a dollop of ice cream; cold hard-boiled eggs; biscuits with marmalade; crackers and cheeses; delicately patterned china and brightly colored cloth napkins; cucumbers and kiwis, freshly sliced.

May our mid-afternoon break be a portal-

--a portal through which treasured memories of those we loved long ago float gently back to us;

--a portal through which we can more clearly see what our best next steps should be;

--and a portal through which we feel: we have labored enough; been clever enough; and apologized for ourselves enough, that we deserve divine forgiveness and love, not just as an occasional respite, but all the live -long day. Amen.

Capital Campaign Update

We now have over \$190,000 in pledges for our building renovations. The board has already started planning the financing, and we have a Committee on Building Renovations to supervise the projects. We're on our way toward new bathrooms, a well-lit RE wing with decent floors, new ceilings in the social hall/sanctuary, and a sanctuary you won't recognize!

But other than raising as much money as possible, the essence of a successful capital campaign is engagement by the entire congregation. At this point, we still have pledges from only about 58% of the congregation; our goal is 100%. No gift is too small because it shows you care! Just fill out a pledge card (behind the sanctuary seats), or mail a check to the UUCC with "Capital Campaign" in the memo line, or send an email stating your pledge to our Administrator at uucc@uucolumbia.org.

The Campaign will officially end on January 31, so whether you do it now or later, please don't forget us! We've made so many improvements to our "fixer-upper" over the past thirty years. Help us make it into a place we're proud to show people.

Adult RE Movie Club: Friday, January 13 *Fix It: Healthcare at the Tipping Point*

The Adult Religious Education Committee would like to invite everyone to watch the movie: *Fix It: Healthcare at the Tipping Point*. This film was two years in the making, with more than forty voices advocating for reform, including: activists, health policy experts, economists, physicians, nurses, patients, business and labor leaders. This 48minute documentary takes an in-depth look into how our dysfunctional health care system is damaging our economy, suffocating our businesses, discouraging physicians and negatively impacting the nation's health, while remaining un-affordable for a third of our citizens.

Adult RE Short Course: *God Is Not One*, Beginning February 12

This spring, a short course at UUCC will be devoted to the eight most broadly practiced world religions (Islam, Christianity, Buddhism, Judaism, Confucianism, Yoruba religion, Daoism, and Atheism). It will be based on the book God is Not One by Stephen Prothero (2010). This book is the successor to Prothero's best-seller Religious Literacy, which emphasizes the importance of a broad acquaintance with the world's religions in a modern America in which there are more Moslems than Episcopalians. The book provides a valuable background for UUCC's greeters, Membership activists who help integrate new friends and members to the congregation, and in general for members of the committees and board of UUCC. UUCC Board of Trustees

Summary of October 19, 2016 Meeting

The Board of Trustees met October 19, 2016 from 6:32 to 8:34 PM.

Welcome to New Board Member

Since our last meeting the Leadership Development Committee recommended to the Board that they select Emilio Perez-Jorge as a member at large. Board members voted electronically to accept this recommendation. Tonight they welcomed Emilio to the Board.

Ministerial Search Committee

Linda Brennison and David Crockett came to this meeting to discuss the salary and benefits to be offered to a prospective settled minister. The Negotiating Committee (Linda, David, and Bob Whitaker) met with two UU consultants; they generally followed the UUA guidelines. The salary to be offered will be a little higher than average for our geographic area; that should make us more attractive to candidates. We will offer UU retirement, health insurance, group disability and life insurance, dental insurance, a professional expense allowance, and one-time moving expenses. The Board approved the Negotiating Committee's salary/benefits recommendations.

Treasurer's Report

Bob Whitaker reported that we are still \$6,000 behind on pledge collections. We collected \$3,800 from fundraising; we had donations for memorials and tributes. We have a positive variance of \$4,100 at the end of the first quarter of our fiscal year.

Committee Reports

<u>**Technology Services Committee</u>** Donald Griggs reported that Lis Turner has been doing wonderful work posting information to the new web page.</u>

<u>Finance Committee</u> The Capital Campaign is progressing nicely. We have 50 pledges totaling \$119,000+ and we have collected \$47,500 to date. New members Quillin and Judy Davis have made an offer to match any amount pledged or donated before November 30, up to a maximum of \$30,000.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

UUCC Coffee House

Tim VanDenBerg met with Steve Fisher and Steve accepted the terms Tim offered. Steve is not interested in forming a tax exempt entity. Apparently some upcoming shows have been cancelled. Some of the more successful shows will be presented later in the season and then the Coffee House will cease to exist.

NEW BUSINESS

Holiday Bonuses

The Board agreed to provide year-end bonuses to our staff in compliance with our Personnel Policy. Rev. Jennie requested that she <u>not</u> receive a bonus.

Ad hoc Committee for Building Renovation

The Board approved the formation of an Ad hoc Committee for Building Renovation. This group will work with the Finance Committee to make recommendations to the Board for financing and timing of the project; work with the Architect in planning; solicit and review input from the congregation on design options and desired use of facilities; recommend contractors; coordinate to minimize disruptions to UUCC activities during construction; keep the congregation apprised of construction plans and progress; participate in ongoing inspections of work; participate in final inspection and approve final payment to general contractor. Members of this group are Richard Culler, Carolyn West, Pat Mohr, Richard McLeod, and Quillin Davis.
