

Our congregation offers a unique space to the religious seeker, to those in search of spiritual roots, and those looking for fellow travelers on the perilous journey of life. Our modern world requires much of us to sustain our bodies and minds. Many distractions exist to numb the pain, to divert our attention from vital questions, and to restrain our curiosity. This congregation is a place where you can share your burdens, ask those vital life questions, and explore in a safe and loving environment.

#### Help Us Make Our UU History Come Alive!

Looking back through Unitarian US history can inspire pride in our faith of choice but more importantly, it can ignite inspiration and courage through the examples of our courageous forbearers as they stood up and fought for justices such as religious freedom. Our teens get to experience with pride and awe the rich history of our UU faith each and every time they trek to Boston. What an experience for them!

But also, what a cost. As many of you know high schoolers today are extremely busy people. In addition to the work they do for their classes, they are writing applications. They are working to help pay for their education. They are trying to play sports. And our UU teens are trying to fulfill many, many hours of work on fundraisers here at the UUCC just to ensure they raise enough money to get to go on this trip. And they do it willingly and with smiles on their faces.

This year we have had to get very creative and ambitious to raise enough money for this spectacular trip. We will have 3 pancakes breakfasts this year, requiring a total of 20 man-hours each. We will hold a Showcase where our children and youth will get to bask in the limelight for a few minutes. This event will require a total of approximately 30 man-hours, what with rehearsals, set building, tech assistance, etc. And these are just the extra fundraisers we have added to our schedule. Overall, our teens and their parents are being asked to contribute more than 50 hours each to raise the funds for this trip! We'll have fun doing it and we will raise the money with your support, for which we are grateful, but we could use some of your blood, sweat, and tears, as well.

All of our fundraisers can use some extra help. Wouldn't you like to get in on the fun? You have probably heard the news that we now have an ad hoc Kitchen Committee and you have likely seen them working hard to clean and organize our kitchen and storeroom. Many hours and lots of elbow grease have gone into the improvement of this place in our building that we use so much. We aren't through yet but do ask that everyone help us out by following a few easy guidelines to make it easier to keep our kitchen clean and functional. Thanks for helping us to help you have a nice clean kitchen.

- 1. If you make dirty dishes please either put them in the dishwasher or hand wash them.
- 2. Do not leave dishes in the sink.
- 3. Wash off counter tops when you are through in the kitchen.
- 4. Do not leave unwanted food on the counters.
- 5. Return items to cupboards where they were found.
- 6. Follow all of the instructions for the use of the refrigerator – remember food left over one week will be thrown out. Be sure there is a name and date on your food.
- 7. Follow all of the instructions for the use of the stove it has been completely cleaned and has new drip pans. Let's keep it that way.
- 8. Be very sure to pay attention to the outlet usage in order to avoid blowing circuits. Instructions are available on the side of the refrigerator and on the Social Hall wall explaining the load for each outlet.

### SHARE THE PLATE

#### Changes coming to Share the Plate Program

Great new changes are planned for the Share the Plate program making it much more efficient and allowing for more categories. The Share the Plate Committee is redefining the Health Issue Category by dividing it into two categories. One will be Physical Health Issues and the other Mental Health Issues. In the past there was only the one category of Health Issues which did not allow both physical and mental health to be addressed equally.

We have new and exciting plans for 2018 making The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) a standalone event no longer including it as a part of Share the Plate. This change gives us the opportunity to free up a category for Mental Health Issues which has been a neglected issue in the past.

The UU Service Committee has been a predetermined Share the Plate recipient for the past three years and it has already agreed to be the same for November 2017. Prior to this time, funds for this very worthy and necessary cause were raised through the UUSC sponsored "Guest at Your Table". We would like to see our Members and Friends united once again behind this excellent program of giving for <u>UUA Social Justice</u> <u>Issues.</u> Beginning in 2018 we will return to the "Guest at your Table" program to raise funds for UUSC and it will no longer be considered a Share the Plate category. #### **NEW PROCEDURE FOR CYRE RELEASE**

Dear Parents and Guardians – We will be bringing your children to you after CYRE classes release. No longer will you have to wait outside our classrooms wondering when your children will be released. And no longer will you have to pry them away from the playground. I think we have devised a way to make the process easier!

Every CYRE Sunday, your children will be led back to the social hall by their teachers. Teachers will keep them in groups, near the children's table in the back, until you, the parent or guardian, comes and signs your child/children out. I

f you would like to allow your children to play on the playground, please escort them from the social hall to the playground. Erin from the nursery will be waiting on the stairs to sign your children out to the playground. Our playground will be staffed from 12:20 to 12:35 each and every clear-weather Sunday. At 12:35 students will be brought back to the social hall to meet up with family. I hope this accomplishes 2 things:

1. You, the parent and/or guardian, will make the decision to let your child/children go outside to the playground and

2. You can monitor more closely how many cookies your children will get to eat before they go home for lunch.

Our teachers are willing to give this a try. Let's see how it works and go from there.

#### UUCC Board of Trustees Summary of July 19, 2017 Meeting

The Board of Trustees met July 19, 2017 from 6:33 PM to 9:39 PM. The meeting was chaired by Richard Culler.

#### Report of ad hoc Committee on Governance and Structure

Keitha Whitaker, chair of the ad hoc committee, presented an overview of their findings which had been made available to the trustees before this meeting. The board discussed the report for about an hour and will work on it again at their all-day retreat on August 26. The board hopes to begin implementation in the coming year. Re-structuring is expected to be a long term process. Richard thanked the committee for their hard work and study which led up to their recommendations and he disbanded the committee.

#### **Treasurer's Report**

Although the new fiscal year has begun the books have not been completely closed for the old year. Bob Whitaker reported he expects a positive variance of about \$15,500 at the end of the year. Part of that money is designated for Rev. Liebmann's moving expenses and his installation in the new year.

The Capital Campaign Fund balance on July 17 was \$116,550.52. Pledges to the Campaign total \$193,699.

#### **Building Renovation Committee**

Peck Brennan is working with the structural engineer to sign off on a new truss design. When that is complete, the plans will be ready to go out for bids.

#### Endowment Committee

John Logue has been elected chair of the committee. Phil described an opportunity that is available: the Shelter Rock Congregation has pledged \$5 million to match any bequest in a will or an estate gift to their foundation; they will give the person's congregation 10% of his/ her gift in 2019-20. Phil has the pledge form to be used.
