

It was reported a few months back that Jason had suffered three stroke events and was working through rehabilitation to regain his abilities. Unfortunately, Jason was the only breadwinner in the family as Kristen has devoted herself to educating and raising their special needs son, Chance.

As you might imagine, this debilitating medical event has been a terrific strain on their finances. And although his rehabilitation is advancing and his blood disease has been diagnosed and is being treated, it will be months before he is able to resume his role as a breadwinner. Who would you like to see as a recipient of 2018 Share the Plate Contributions?

The Share the Plate Committee is getting ready to begin the Share the Plate process for the coming year. UUCC donates half of our cash collections each month to an outside charity or social justice organization chosen by our members. There are eleven categories of recipients determined by the Share the Plate Committee. Now is the time to be thinking about what organizations you would like to nominate for any one of these categories. The nominating process begins October 1. The qualifying nominees must be a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that is <u>not</u> affiliated with UUA. To confirm the status, check the organization's website to determine if it is a 501(c)(3).

We want you to be part of this process. A Share the Plate Nomination Table will be set up in the Social Hall. We invite you to bring suggestions or materials to describe the qualifying community non-profit organizations that you would like to see the congregation nominate. Share the Plate Nominations forms will be available October 1, 2017.

The eleven categories are as follows:

Animal shelters/Animal services Children's services Food banks/Food support Environmental issues Homeless shelters Legal aid LGBT issues Mental Health issues Physical Health issues Social Justice issues Women's issues

Share the Plate Schedule for 2018

October 1 - 15: The Share the Plate committee will accept and vet nominations from the Congregation for 2018 recipients.

October 15 - October 29: Share the Plate Committee determines the final two recipient nominees in each category and creates a voting ballot.

November 5 - November 19: The Congregation votes to select the final 2018 Share the Plate Recipients.

December 10 - The 2018 Share the Plate Recipients will be announced

Notice Anything New About Our Kitchen?

You have probably heard the news that we now have an ad hoc Kitchen Committee and you have likely seen them working hard to clean and organize our kitchen and storeroom. Many hours and lots of elbow grease have gone into the improvement of this place in our building that we use so much. We aren't through yet but do ask that everyone help us out by following a few easy guidelines to make it easier to keep our kitchen clean and functional. Thanks for helping us to help you have a nice clean kitchen.

1. If you make dirty dishes please either put them in the dishwasher or hand wash them.

2. Do not leave dishes in the sink.

3. Wash off counter tops when you are through in the kitchen.

4. Do not leave unwanted food on the counters.

5. Return items to cupboards where they were found.

6. Follow all of the instructions for the use of the refrigerator - remember food left over one week will be thrown out. Be sure there is a name and date on your food.

7. Follow all of the instructions for the use of the stove -ithas been completely cleaned and has new drip pans. Let's keep it that way.

8. Be very sure to pay attention to the outlet usage in order to avoid blowing circuits. Instructions are available on the side of the refrigerator and on the Social Hall wall explaining the load for each outlet.

Procedure for CYRE Release

Dear Parents and Guardians – We will be bringing your children to you after CYRE classes release.

Every CYRE Sunday, your children will be led back to the social hall by their teachers. Teachers will keep them in groups, near the children's table in the back, until you, the parent or guardian, comes and signs your child/children out. If you would like to allow your children to play on the playground, please escort them from the social hall to the playground. Erin from the nursery will be waiting on the stairs to sign your children out to the playground. Our playground will be staffed from 12:20 to 12:35 each and every clear-weather Sunday. At 12:35 students will be brought back to the social hall to meet up with family. I hope this accomplishes 2 things: You, the parent and/or guardian, will make the 1. decision to let your child/children go outside to the playground; and

 You can monitor more closely how many cookies your children will get to eat before they go home for lunch.
