We began 2018 with a bang! Our first Fellowship Lunch on January 7 was a rousing success (other than running out of food because the demand was so high!). Your Membership and Kitchen Committees offered to help coordinate future lunches, so look forward to more opportunities to gather after Sunday morning worship.

More than 60 people attended the Boston Declaration Teach-In after lunch that day. The conversation was lively and important. I shared the video and your feedback to the original organizers and have already been asked by the former Provost of the Meadville Lombard Theological Seminary to participate in an effort to craft a Unitarian Universalist response to the Declaration. I will be seeking your advice and input as the project progresses.

I am not sorry to see 2017 go. Even though its passing makes me a year older, I will not miss enduring the daily trauma of incompetence and criminal behavior reported on the nightly news by elected officials who do not represent the will or the moral fiber of the American people. I believe 2018 should be our Year of Hope – hope that we can make a difference in our communities, at the polls, and in capitols from Columbia SC to the District of Columbia.

Unitarian Universalism is not just a Living Tradition from the standpoint of religion, philosophy, or spirituality. Our Unitarian Universalist ancestors have always stood for the search for truth, equal treatment of all people under democratic law, and the functional merger of our personal growth with our congregational growth as an organization of public activism and social reform. As your Board leads us toward a new mission statement and articulates goals for our future, 2018 will be remembered as a watershed year for the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Columbia.

Make no mistake. The time is coming when the principles of our faith may well be tested. Like Waitstill and Martha Sharp, who sacrificed much to rescue refugees from Nazi Germany, and like our abolitionist ancestors who sheltered slaves fleeing inhuman oppression, we may be called upon to engage in extraordinary acts of courage and commitment. I am in conversation with the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee helping coordinate the response of our congregations to the possible need for a new Underground Railroad of sanctuary and resistance to tyranny and bigotry.

So, know that you are not alone in your concerns for your well being and that of others. Our congregation is not alone in taking a stand for equality, fairness, and justice. And our denomination is not alone in its dedication to ending the oppression of poverty, violence, and discrimination.

Direction Reflection Exploration

A meaningful and well-organized Children and Youth program is not the result of the work of one person. It is the love that springs from our collective hearts; love that looks for a place to live and grow. Where it will, perhaps, grow in fertile hearts that will nurture the love and let it spread out and continue to serve the next generations. And on it goes. As I work with our children and youth I can see the love that is being shared by our entire congregation and I can envision these young people growing up and spreading their love and values with their children. It is this is the gift that you are giving when you volunteer with and for our UCC youngsters.

Denominational Connections – January 2018

Happy 2018! Wow! 2017 was a year to let go of, right? I know we can do better and I am looking forward to the opportunities and possibilities that 2018 offers. For instance, our congregation will soon have the opportunity to give input on which Congregational Study Action Issues (CSAIs) delegates to General Assembly will vote on this year. Watch your Eblast or Order of Service for more information as it becomes available.

What is a CSAI and why is it important for UUs?

Every two years, the Commission on Social Witness (CSW) receives proposals from congregations for Congregational Study Action Issues (CSAIs), each hoping theirs will be selected and will eventually result in a UUA Statement of Conscience. The Study and Action Process was created to uphold our principles and to engage Unitarian Universalists in the articulation of our conscience on pressing social justice issues. The process is initiated by congregations and culminates with the delegates at General Assembly (GA). The CSW facilitates transitions from one phase to the next.

After three years of study and action on a CSAI, the General Assembly delegates may adopt a Statement of Conscience (SOC) on the subject. It is the product of countless hours of thought, collaboration, and dedication. During the year following adoption of a SOC, congregations and UUA staff will work to implement the SOC and report their results to the following General Assembly. Adopted Statements of Conscience focus the efforts of congregations and other UU groups on the topic of the SOC, shape the meaning of contemporary Unitarian Universalism, and empower the UUA staff to lobby our positions in pending legislation.

Participation in this process can empower congregations and individuals to boldly focus our efforts at addressing critical social justice issues in the world at large and, indeed, within our own congregations. Remember, “We are better together.”

So, let us step forward together into this new year of opportunities and possibilities. Let 2018 be the year that we come together in bold new ways to change the world for the better, together!
