



My maternal grandmother, “Nanny”, died this past April at the age of 97. While preparing for her funeral, my mother, sisters and I spent hours reminiscing while looking through old photos and keepsakes.

Not surprisingly, our individual memories did not always match the official party line attached to every photo. A picture of the barn reminded me of the hours spent jumping from the loft into a pile of hay. This same picture reminded my mom of the summers spent picking cotton. And we all remembered Nanny’s story about how her Uncle Joe had stolen the family land, including the barn, after the untimely death of her father.

We also found a dog-eared copy of the Antioch Cookbook, a collection of recipes submitted by members of Nanny’s Presbyterian church family. My personal copy at home is circa 1992 – Nanny’s edition was a few decades older.

As we flipped through, we discovered that the recipes had not really changed. The big difference, however, was Nanny’s handwritten notes accompanying many of the recipes, in particular those from her older sister, Pauline. The recipe with the most notes was for Aunt Pauline’s pecan pie. Aunt Pauline was a dark corn syrup, whole-pecan kind of baker. Nanny, as the notes reminded us, preferred light corn syrup and crushed pecans.

While perusing recipes for casseroles, jello dishes, and baked goods, we shared stories of Nanny and Aunt Pauline and their lifetime together of joys and sorrows. We soon realized that Nanny’s process of recipe revision had less to do with her desire for quality improvement than it did with her need for emotional healing, and a chance to forgive and to be forgiven.

I suspect many of us have similar stories, passed through generations, of intra-family squabbles, and can attest to the exponential effects these disagreements are capable of producing. Perhaps some of us have had these experiences with members of our UUCC family. For some, the pain is too severe and departure the only solution. For others, the wound is quickly paved over before the healing is complete. Now, we are struggling to find our bearings in the wake of Rev. Jeff's departure.

To aid with our Community's healing, our friends at the Tree of Life synagogue have invited us to join them this September 1st for Selichot to kick-off to the Jewish High Holy Days. Rabbi Eric Mallo has offered to meet with members of our congregation at 6:30pm to explain the significance of Selichot. Then, there will be a movie at 7pm followed by service at 8pm.

Wherever you are in your personal journey for peace, I hope you will consider this opportunity to help us find a common path forward.

"Wisdom begins in wonder." Socrates
And the wise continue to wonder.

As I work to prepare for the 2018/2019 CYRE classes, I have searched for what makes a great teacher; a great CYRE teacher, that is. Is it necessary to be an expert in your field? No, not really. Is it knowing all of the right answers and helping students find them? Not really. What is truly important is the nurturing of each and every child's sense of wonder. And that takes practice for those of us who have been trained to live in the world of facts and logic. What does it matter if a child grows up learning astrophysics if she loses the ability to be in awe of the night sky? What have we done for a child if their amazement about the life in tidal pool becomes only a fierce need to classifying and categorizing the life forms? Imagine seeing the deep orange of a Monarch butterfly and quickly dismissing its beauty with the thought that you already know what that species is so never mind! No need to spend another moment thinking about it. If we do not encourage the child to ask questions and wonder why, we have failed to enrich and nurture that essential part of the human being who looks out into the world with awe, with appreciative wonder.

Keeping the awe alive is what Religious Exploration is about. Yes, we teach about the great prophets, about our UU roots and other necessary things but we approach the learning with a tenderness that encourages the child's imagination and sense of wonder. We create environments where that sense can flourish. By providing a safe place for children to share thoughts and experiences, we show an appreciation for one another and give our selves an opportunity to learn in ways we never before thought about or have moved beyond. I was reminded of this as I taught OWL this past week. In class we talked about families and how we learn from one another. One of the older students was asked how she could learn from her younger sibling and she responded that she could learn all over again how to be that younger age, how to experience life as a younger person. That was pretty remarkable as most of us only think of learning from folks older than ourselves. I was in awe of this youngster's insight and I will do all I can to make sure we keep ourselves in this place of awe and continue to nurture that in our CYRE classrooms. Thanks to all the folks who work to keep this awe and wonder alive and well.

News and Notes

Wake Now Our Vision Campaign

The UUCC Endowment Committee recently had its initial FY2019 meeting and we have decided to focus our main efforts on the UUA Wake Now Campaign. The Wake Now Campaign provides an amazing opportunity in which a legacy gift (including the UUCC in one's will) of a UUCC member or friend will immediately be *matched at 10% of the gift*. This will be *in cash to UUCC no strings attached*. As an example, if someone has in their will that UUCC will receive \$10,000 upon execution of the will, UUCC would receive \$1,000 now if that person had submitted the Wake Now form and a copy of the relevant pages of the will to the UUA.

That's the good news. The not so good news is that there is a limited amount of money and it is on a first-come basis, and this campaign will be conducted for a limited time.

The board has set \$500,000 in legacy gifts as a goal. If reached, this would mean an infusion of \$50,000 into the UUCC budget. Think of what that could mean! If you have already submitted a Wake Now form and the relevant portion of your will and have not let the Endowment Committee know, please consider doing so.

No names will be shared, and the information will only be presented in the aggregate for publicity and planning.


