


The Mountain

New Art Exhibit and Reception

Please join Ann and Kate at their Reception in the Social Hall this Sunday, March 15 from 3-5pm.

Our current exhibit in the social hall is a collection of acrylic paintings by Ann Cargill and Kate Heald. These works are the product of a class at the Campbell Folk School titled "Fearless Painting," taught by Chattanooga artist, Bradley Campbell. In this class, the instructor provided daily prompts that encouraged the students to paint quickly, circumvent their inner critics and enjoy their painting more.

Ann Cargill is a retired software developer who first began working with colored pencils when her children went off to college and she had lots of time to play. She says, "I loved sitting in a sunny upstairs window, drawing for the pleasure of feeling my hand on the paper and watching the way the colors swirl and blend together." Over the years, she has tried many different artistic media; her favorites have been colored pencil and book binding. She is currently learning to paint with acrylics.

Kate Heald, who was looking for a creative outlet after she retired, walked into Howard Hunt's Paint Your Bum Off Wednesday and was hooked. Since then, she has played around with oils, acrylics and mixed media with the help of local artists, artists brought in by Crooked Creek Art League, and the folks at John C. Campbell Folk School. She loves color, movement, and texture, and paints some from her travel photos. She is always happy to be at John C. Campbell, where she finds novel challenges and patient instruction, in a beautiful, positive, non-competitive environment. The dining hall was not open for the first few days so we brought food and prepared our own meals in Emerson Cottage. We invited current long-term volunteers to join us, making for a crowded kitchen and living room and allowing us to become acquainted with others who share our love of The Mountain. And each evening our group gathered after dinner for wine, conversation, board games, and sympathy for one another's sore muscles.

The weather was not always perfectly cooperative. After a few chilly but dry days the rain came, giving challenge to moving laundered items from one location to another. A pause in precipitation allowed us to finish the last of the re-locations. Then more rain, turning to sleet, and finally to snow...several hours of softly falling snow. We could enjoy this winter wonderland fully since we were not responsible for the safety of workers and visitors and therefore didn't need to shovel or sand the roads and walkways.
