

Message From Our Minister

Rumi has a beautiful poem that is often used in mindfulness training, entitled "The Guest House."

The Guest House

This being human is a guest house. Every morning a new arrival. A joy, a depression, a meanness, some momentary awareness comes as an unexpected visitor. Welcome and entertain them all! Even if they are a crowd of sorrows. who violently sweep your house empty of its furniture, still, treat each guest honorably. He may be clearing you out for some new delight. The dark thought, the shame, the malice, meet them at the door laughing and invite them in. Be grateful for whatever comes, because each has been sent as a guide from beyond.

Rumi's description of a human as a house who is constantly welcoming visitors of new experiences and emotions, the ebb and flow of life all making their way to be a guest in your home of yourself. The newest arrival of experience and emotion in my guest house has actually involved a new arrival in our home. Luna Wilde was born on August 4th, and has been the beautiful combination of our overwhelming joy and lack of sleep since day one. When this Unigram gets published, she will already be a week old, and we find ourselves trying to slow down the drumbeat of time and savor each moment. We know that her curious eyes and grasping fingers and toes are learning so much about her world at such an exponentially fast pace. We find ourselves pausing to enjoy being observers and facilitators of that learning while pondering what we are learning about ourselves.

Message From UUCC Treasurer

Monthly financial reports are normally posted in the social hall so that congregation members can be aware of our financial position. The reports are still being posted, thanks to our wonderful office staff, but because of the shutdown - no one can see them. Hopefully these notes will provide everyone in the congregation our status at the close of the fiscal year at June 30.

- 1-Revenue for the fiscal year totaled about 95% of the budgeted amount primarily due to pledge amounts remaining unpaid. Other budgeted items (especially rental revenue) which were low were generally offset by the revenue from the very successful rummage sale held last summer.
- 2-We received a PPP loan of \$23,100 through the federal government's CARES Act. It is our belief that the entire amount will be forgiven when we make application, which is scheduled for September. In the meantime, \$5,000 of the loan amount has been applied to payroll expenses for the month of June.
- 3-Expenses for the year ended at about 80% of budget, primarily due to three factors:
 - A- CYRE expenditures were about 25% lower than recent previous years.
 - B- Committee expenditures for the final third of the year were quite low. Most standing committees practiced responsible stewardship and did not spend their budgeted amounts in preparation for the new fiscal year.
 - C- As mentioned above, a portion of the PPP loan was applied to June expenses.
- 4-Our current cash position is acceptable, but it is important to remember that a very large portion of our available cash is due to the PPP loan.
- 5- Surprising as it seems, very little of our budget is discretionary. Prior to our shutdown, fully 97% of our expenditures were for facilities maintenance and personnel. These expenses have changed very little over the past several months, and we expect that they will continue to remain at the same level through the remainder of the shutdown.

Going forward through the remainder of the pandemic and our shutdown, it's critical that we all continue to financially support the UUCC.

Dillard Thompson, a long-time UUCC member, passed away after battling a long illness on Thursday, August 6.

Dillard became a Unitarian Universalist while still in high school. In the early Seventies he joined the UU of Columbia where he held leadership positions within the Congregation including being a member of the Board of Trustees.

All those who knew and loved Dillard were impressed with his intelligence and resourcefulness. Despite being partially paralyzed by a stroke in his forties, Dillard lived a long and full life. When he made a friend, he held on to them for life and he was in regular contact with friends from his years at Furman University and even from his high school days in Sumter, SC.

In his younger days, Dillard was an exceptionally good athlete. He played baseball as a little leaguer and was a star basketball player in high school. After graduation from Furman University, Dillard went on to work for the Social Security Administration, marry and have a son, Jonathan.

You can schedule a recurring meeting, e.g., every Thursday 4-5 p.m., but make sure all these slots are available throughout the time period.

You will be contacted via email by a UUCC Zoom Host with access information. The host will work with you to determine the assistance you might require in hosting your Zoom meeting.

The host will start the meeting and stay on as needed or leave the meeting making you or a designee the host.

NOTE: Use of the Zoom accounts follows the established policy on building usage, i.e., the use must originate from a UUCC committee or be approved by the Board and the event must be placed on the official UUCC calendar by our Administrator, Andrea Dudick (uucc@uucolumbia.org).

Moderated Discussion on the Book White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism by Robin DiAngelo


Please join us for a moderated discussion of the controversial New York Times bestseller, *White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism*, by Robin DiAngelo. Robin DiAngelo is an academic, lecturer, and author and has been a consultant and trainer on issues of racial and social justice for more than twenty years. She formerly served as a tenured professor of multicultural education at Westfield State University.

White Fragility explores the counterproductive reactions white people have when their assumptions about race are challenged, and how these reactions maintain racial inequality.

Highlighting Community Resources:

Richland Library and Columbia Housing Authority SC are excited to bring Internet access to 26 Columbia Housing communities thanks to the Home•Spot program. Funded by the McNulty Foundation and the Richland Library Friends and Foundation, the year-long program gives residents access to 65 mobile hot spots as well as the digital resources that can help them learn, create and share; go back to school; stay in touch with loved ones remotely; and utilize basic services that have moved to digital platforms. A Word About UUA Regions and Districts

New members may not be aware of the fact that our UU congregations are organized into five *regions*. Mid America, Central East, New England, Pacific Western, and our own Southern Region. These regions and their staffs are coordinated by the Director of Congregational Life, Jessica York, a native of Birmingham, Alabama, of the Unitarian Universalist Association, headquartered in Boston,

Each region approaches congregational collaboration and identity differently. Some regions have districts with distinct governing boards, others retain their district identities but have transferred governance to our UUA Board, and still others have let go of districts and focus simply on one single regional identity.

Each region is served by a Regional Lead and a team of Congregational Life Staff, who provide a wide variety of congregational services.

Southern Region

The Southern Region has consolidated staff and efforts to equip congregations with the effective leadership and training they need to build and nurture strong, dynamic congregations for the 21st century throughout the South, from Texas to Virginia. The region comprises the former Florida, Mid-South, Southeast, and Southwest districts, which many of us recall.
